As I was sitting down to write this brief article, I looked back to see what I had written last March. In that newsletter, we had just completed our first day of remote instruction. I also remarked how well it had gone even though we had gone into it fully unprepared. There was a certain naïveté where it was obvious that I was unaware that we would not be returning to our school buildings last year. Although there is more to do, we have come a long way since then.

On Tuesday, I sent a letter to all of our families explaining our next phase. This will likely be the last phase of 2020-2021 and it will begin on April 15. This new schedule will double the amount of time that our in-person students will be in the school buildings. There was a caveat to make this happen in that, with more students returning to schools, we would not be able to guarantee the 6-foot social distancing. However, as expected, today the CDC has revised their guidelines for social distancing. According to the AP, "Students can safely sit just 3 feet apart in the classroom as long as they wear masks, but should be kept the usual 6 feet away from one another at sporting events, assemblies, lunch or chorus practice." (https://apnews.com/article/coronavirus-pandemic-72584a00c039546f02eceb3715063e35) In that same article, they list the major revisions as:

- Removes recommendations for plastic shields or other barriers between desks.
- Advises at least 3 feet of space between desks in elementary schools, even in towns and cities where community spread is high, so long as students and teachers wear masks and take other precautions.
- Spacing can also be 3 feet in middle and high schools, so long as there is not a high level of spread in the community. If there is, spacing should be at least 6 feet.
- The CDC said 6 feet should still be maintained in common areas, such as school lobbies, and when masks can't be worn, such as when eating.
- Also, students should be kept 6 feet apart in situations where there are a lot of people talking, cheering or singing, all of which can expel droplets containing the coronavirus. That includes chorus practice, assemblies and sporting events.
- Teachers and other adults should continue to stay 6 feet from one another and from students.

Our principals have been collecting survey responses from our families and, with warmer weather and the revised CDC standards, many more people are choosing to return to school. The response rate has been high but please make sure you complete the survey for each child in your family so that we are fully prepared for April 15.

Finally, there was one other important change in my letter from earlier this week. When we return from spring break on April 6, we will be fully remote until the next phase begins on April 15, 2021. We know we will be having a lot of families traveling over the break. Many have been cooped up in their houses for a year and have not been able to visit loved ones, friends, or just relax. Take this time to recharge and be safe so that we can end this year on a high note!

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All Virtual PD Day for Staff

As students began a four-day weekend on Friday, February 12, BRSD teachers and staff members embarked upon the district's first ever "all virtual" professional development day.

This presentation was created by five district staff members, Mike Melvin, 6-12 Supervisor of Mathematics; Michele Henry, K-5 Assistant Principal for Curriculum and Instruction; Megan Geibel, Peter Muschal Principal; Taylor Gilbert, Middle School Social Studies Teacher; and Jason Zablow, High School Health/Physical Education Teacher, after they attended the workshop "Reimagining Instruction and Assessment: Making Learning Meaningful and Relevant for ALL Learners - During In-Person, Blended, and Virtual Learning Environments" as part of the district's membership in the New Jersey Consortia for Excellence Through Equity. This presentation prompted district educators to remember their "why" during these trying times and implored all to "create change with equity at the core."



Clara Barton School News

Moments in Bordentown Black History. February 22-27, we highlighted some moments in Bordentown History which were specific to Black achievements and history – some right in Bordentown. Prepared by Mrs. Tuesday Robinson, these written pieces will be framed and displayed. It was important for all of us to learn about the rich history of the Bordentown black community in celebration of Black History Month.

- Black History Month started as a week, 95 years ago, to share, educated, remember, celebrate, embrace the lives and recognize the accomplishments of those who paved the way for the African American community.
- In 1917 Reverend William Bragg Sr., and six members of a mission, held their first church service in Maron Hall. By 1923 they acquired property and then opened the Shiloh Baptist Church. Reverend Bragg passed away in 1969 at age 107, and when you walk the halls of Clara Barton you can say hello to Reverend Bragg's great-granddaughter, Mrs. Robinson, and great-great granddaughter, Leyonna Robinson!
- Bordentown Manual Training and Industrial School was the first all-black boarding school for middle and high school students on the East Coast! It was open 1890-1954 on 400 acres of land in Bordentown. Students could learn trades, academics, sports, and music. They had formal dances and students resided at the school in dormitories. Students could also attend lectures and examples of some famous lecturers at the school were Albert Einstein and W.E.B. DuBois.
- The Number Two School The first school for black children in Bordentown and was opened in 1842. In 1926 Bordentown was the second largest town in Burlington County and there were two school buildings – one for white students and one for black students which was called the Number Two School. The schools remained separate until 1948 when they were desegregated six years before it was mandated by Brown v Board of Ed.
- We untangled the history of black hair and were recommended to read "Hair Love" by Matthew Cherry.

Counselor Corner: Please meet Miss M! Marina Melillo began at Clara Barton in late December 2020. She has been working to get to know all the CBS students. Every month at Clara Barton we are focusing on a social emotional topic. Did you know February is Random Acts of Kindness month? We focused on promoting kindness all month long. As a school wide initiative our students participated in a Kindness Calendar Challenge. Each class had a Kindness Jar and Kindness Calendar. Every morning in February Miss M. spoke about an act of kindness during announcements. At the end of the week, she came around to see which classes completed an act of kindness and give them a Kindness Coin to put in their Kindness Jar! At the end of the month each class got a prize for completing

the calendar. Guidance lessons were also focused on promoting kindness. Miss M read the story "A Little Spot of Kindness" to each class, and completed a little activity where students made their own spot of kindness craft. Clara Barton had a February filled with kindness. We will continue to spread kindness every day!
